A Memorial to Charles Drewes 1947 – 2005



When Charlie Drewes died of a heart attack on July 4th a beloved friend left the scientific community. Charlie was a professor in the Ecology, Evolution and Organismal Biology Department at Iowa State University (ISU) and was an active and influential member of the Iowa Academy of Science where he served on the Board of Directors. He was an inspiration and a mentor to scientists, teachers, and students. A friend and teacher summed up the thoughts that many of us have for Charlie:

"He was tireless in his support of so many people, from a seventh grader in Florida, working on a science project, to his colleagues at major universities. I think some of his most valued relationships were with the high school teachers he so enjoyed helping at Lakeside Labs, the National Association of Biology Teachers, the Iowa Science Teachers Section of the Iowa

Academy of Science, and many others. So many students have benefited from Charlie's inspiration to teachers across the nation. His dedication to *teaching*, a rare commitment at a university, is what I admired most about him."

He received Iowa State's Outstanding Teacher Award (1991), the Distinguished Iowa Science Teacher Award from the Iowa Academy of Science (1998), the NABT Four-Year College Biology Teaching Award (2002) and became a Fellow of the Academy in 2005. Charlie Drewes received a BA in Biology from Augustana College (SD) and an MS and PhD in zoology from Michigan State University. His research focused on rapid escape reflexes and locomotion, especially in oligochaete worms. He taught courses in invertebrate biology, neurobiology and bioethics. During summers, he led hands-on, residential workshops for high school biology teachers at Iowa Lakeside Lab. Year-round; he was actively engaged in educational outreach projects and presentations. The membership of the Iowa Academy of Science has been honored to have Charlie as a friend.

Dr. Rick Lampe, professor of biology at BVU and past president of the Iowa Academy of Science, says that the school's membership in the IAS is an outcome of BVU's drive to be part of the scientific community: "The IAS gives Buena Vista University yet another way to support scientific activities across the state."

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ISTS Fall Conference Keynote Speaker, Dr. Robert Yager



Robert Yager was employed in 1956 as Acting Head of the Science Education program and Chair of the Department of Science in the University Laboratory Schools. Upon completion of the Ph.D. he was appointed to a tenure position as an Assistant Professor; he was promoted to full professor in 1967.

During his 48 years at the University of Iowa, Yager has served as president of seven national organizations, including the National Association for the Education of Teachers of Science, the National Science Teachers Association, and the National Association for Research in Science Teaching. He has directed over 100 NSF institutes for teachers and workshops for high school students. He has published over 600 books, chapters, and research reports. He has received many honors including the Carleton Award by NSTA (1977) and Distinguished Service (1986), Governor's Science Medal (1990), Vasconceles World Award of Education (1988), ICASE Distinguished Service (1999), and ISMC Lifetime Distinguished Service (1999). Yager has chaired 120 Ph.D. dissertations, served on another 100 Ph.D. committees, and chaired over 200 master's degree committees.

He assisted with implementing the visions of the National Science Education Standards and has led with Science-Technology-Society reforms around the world.

At his luncheon presentation, Dr. Yager will discus the modern business of science education from his 50 year perspective--its past, present, and future in our ever-increasingly complex and interwoven society."



RICK WELLS


